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# On some constants related to the harmonic zeta function

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**Abstract** Using Ramanujan's summation method applied to certain specific divergent series involving harmonic numbers and powers of logarithms, we define a variety of noteworthy constants and study their properties. In particular, we clarify their close connection with the Stieltjes constants of the harmonic zeta function *ζH*.

**Keywords** Harmonic zeta function; Stieltjes constants; zeta values; Bernoulli numbers; digamma function; Ramanujan summation of divergent series.

### **1 Introduction**

The harmonic zeta function  $\zeta_H$  is defined for  $\text{Re}(s) > 1$  by

$$
\zeta_H(s) := \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{H_n}{n^s},
$$

where, for all integers  $n \geq 1$ ,

$$
H_n = 1 + \frac{1}{2} + \dots + \frac{1}{n}
$$

are the classical harmonic numbers. Four decades ago, completing Euler's original research [11], Apostol and Vu [1] and Matsuoka [12] showed that this function could be continued as a meromorphic function with a double pole at *s* = 1, and simple poles at  $s = 0$  and at odd negative integers. The Laurent expansion of the harmonic zeta function  $\zeta_H$  around its double pole can be written as

$$
\zeta_H(s) = \frac{1}{(s-1)^2} + \frac{\gamma}{s-1} + \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^k}{k!} \gamma_H^{(k)}(s-1)^k \quad (0 < |s-1| < 1),
$$

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where  $\gamma = -\Gamma'(1)$  is Euler's constant, and the coefficents  $\gamma_H^{(k)}$  are called harmonic Stieltjes constants by analogy with the classical Stieltjes constants  $\gamma_k$ . From now on and throughout the text, we will use the lighter notation  $\gamma^{(k)}$  in place of  $\gamma_H^{(k)}$ . An explicit expression of  $\gamma^{(0)}$  is given by the following formula [6, Equation (6)]:

$$
\gamma^{(0)} = \frac{1}{2}\gamma^2 + \frac{1}{2}\zeta(2) = \frac{1}{2}\,\Gamma^{(2)}(1)\,. \tag{1}
$$

As pointed out by Young, in view of the relation  $\zeta_H(s) = \zeta(s, 1) + \zeta(s + 1)$ , this nice expression is nothing else than a special case of a more general formula which applies to height one multiple zeta functions  $\zeta(s, 1, \ldots, 1)$  of arbitrary depth [13, Equation (28)].

Regarding the classical Stieltjes constants, we recall the well-known asymptotic representation of  $\gamma_k$  (see e.g. [7]):

$$
\gamma_k = \lim_{N \to \infty} \left\{ \sum_{n=1}^N \frac{(\ln n)^k}{n} - \frac{(\ln N)^{k+1}}{k+1} \right\} \qquad (k \ge 0).
$$

From the point of view adopted here, the constant  $\gamma_k$  can be interpreted as the  $\mathcal{R}$ -sum of the divergent series  $\sum$  $\overline{n\geqslant}1$  $(\ln n)^k$ *n* [4, p. 67], i.e. the sum of the series in the sense of Ramanujan's summation method, following the exposition in [4] (see also [5, Chapter IX]). The existence of a similar asymptotic representation for  $\gamma^{(k)}$ :

$$
\gamma^{(k)} = \lim_{N \to \infty} \left\{ \sum_{n=1}^{N} \frac{H_n(\ln n)^k}{n} - \frac{(\ln N)^{k+2}}{k+2} - \gamma \frac{(\ln N)^{k+1}}{k+1} \right\} \qquad (k \ge 0),
$$

which results from a generalization of a formula of Briggs and Buschman [2, 3], strongly suggests that the constants  $\gamma^{(k)}$  are closely linked to the R-sum of the divergent series  $\sum$  $\overline{n\geqslant}1$  $H_n (\ln n)^k$ *n* for arbitrary *k*. As we shall see, this is indeed the case: such a relation exists (see Proposition 1 below) although far less simple than in the previous case. In earlier studies  $[6,$  Equation  $(4)$ ],  $[8,$  Equation  $(5.1)$ ], we have already drawn attention to the interesting relation:

$$
r_1 = \gamma_1 + \tau_1 + \gamma^{(0)} - \zeta(2) = \gamma_1 + \tau_1 + \frac{1}{2}\gamma^2 - \frac{1}{2}\zeta(2),
$$
 (2)

where

$$
\tau_1 := \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^{n+1}}{n} \zeta(n+1) = -\sum_{n=2}^{\infty} \zeta'(n) , \text{ and } \tau_1 := \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{H_n}{n} .
$$

it should be noted that the constant  $\tau_1$  arises in several contexts in number theory (see e.g. [14] for a summary of these occurrences). The main purpose of this article is to determine to what extent this formula can be generalized. This can be done in several ways. A fairly natural way of extending formula (2), involving the Roman harmonic numbers  $H_{n,k}$  in place of the classic harmonic numbers  $H_n$ , was successfully explored by Young [13, Theorem 6.1]. More precisely, for arbitrary  $k \geq 1$ , if

$$
H_{n,k} := \sum_{\substack{n \ge n_1 \ge \dots \ge n_k \ge 1 \\ n \equiv 1}} \frac{1}{n_1 n_2 \cdots n_k} = \sum_{j=1}^n (-1)^{j-1} \binom{n}{j} j^{-k},
$$
  

$$
\tau_1^{[k]} := \sum_{n=1}^\infty \frac{(-1)^{n+1}}{n} \zeta(n+1, \underbrace{1, \dots, 1}_{k-1}),
$$

and  $\gamma_1^{[k]}$  denotes the first Stieltjes constant of the height one zeta function of depth *k*, *ζ*(*s,* 1*, . . . ,* 1  $\overline{k-1}$ ), then it can be shown that the following general relation holds

true:

$$
\sum_{n\geq 1}^{\mathcal{R}} \frac{H_{n,k}}{n} = \gamma_1^{[k]} + \tau_1^{[k]} + P_{k+1}(\gamma, -\zeta(2), \dots, (-1)^k \zeta(k+1)),
$$

with  $P_n$  denoting the modified Bell polynomials defined by means of their generating function:

$$
\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} P_n(x_1, \dots, x_n) t^n = \exp\left(\sum_{k=1}^{\infty} x_k \frac{t^k}{k}\right)
$$
  
= 1 + x\_1 t + \frac{1}{2} (x\_1^2 + x\_2) t^2 + \frac{1}{6} (x\_1^3 + 3x\_1 x\_2 + 2x\_3) t^3 + \cdots

In the simplest case  $k = 1$ , formula (2) is regained since  $H_{n,1} = H_n$ ,  $\tau_1^{[1]} = \tau_1$ , and  $\gamma_1^{[1]} = \gamma_1$ . Note that this remarkable identity may also be rewritten under the following equivalent form:

$$
\sum_{n\geq 1}^{\mathcal{R}} \frac{P_k(H_n,\ldots,H_n^{(k)})}{n} = \gamma_1^{[k]} + \tau_1^{[k]} + P_{k+1}(\gamma,-\zeta(2),\ldots,(-1)^k \zeta(k+1)),
$$
  

$$
H_n^{(k)} = \sum_{n=1}^n j^{-k}.
$$

with *H*  $n^{(k)} =$ *j*=1 *j*

We now present another natural way of generalizing formula  $(2)$ , starting with the following definitions:

**Definition 1.** For any positive integer *k*, the constants  $\tau_k$  and  $r_k$  are defined by

$$
\tau_k := \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^{n+k}}{n^k} \zeta(n+1)
$$
, and  $r_k = \sum_{n\geq 1}^{\infty} \frac{H_n(\ln n)^{k-1}}{n}$ .

Although not used afterwards, we also mention another expression of the constant  $\tau_k$  which can be easily deduced from the definition above:

$$
\tau_k = (-1)^k \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{1}{n} \operatorname{Li}_k\left(-\frac{1}{n}\right) \qquad (k \ge 1),
$$

where  $Li_k$  denotes the *k*th polylogarithm. In particular, for  $k = 1$ , the formula

$$
\tau_1 = \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{1}{n} \ln\left(1 + \frac{1}{n}\right)
$$

is regained. In the following section, we clarify the link between the constants  $\tau_k$ , *r<sub>k</sub>* and  $\gamma^{(k)}$  defined above.

## **2** How the constants  $\tau_k$ ,  $r_k$  and  $\gamma^{(k)}$  are linked **together**

As announced, the forthcoming Proposition 1 successfully generalizes formula (2).

**Proposition 1.** For any positive integer *n*, the following relations hold true:

$$
r_{2n} = \frac{\gamma_{2n}}{2n} + (2n - 1)!\,\tau_{2n} + \gamma^{(2n - 1)} + \sum_{k=1}^{n} \frac{(2n - 1)!}{(2n - 2k)!} \times \frac{(2^{2k - 1} - 1)}{2^{2k - 2}}\,\gamma_{2n - 2k}\,\zeta(2k)\,,\tag{3}
$$

and

$$
r_{2n+1} = \frac{\gamma_{2n+1}}{2n+1} + (2n)! \tau_{2n+1} + \gamma^{(2n)} + \sum_{k=1}^{n} \frac{(2n)!}{(2n-2k+1)!} \times \frac{(2^{2k-1}-1)}{2^{2k-2}} \gamma_{2n-2k+1} \zeta(2k) - (2n)! \frac{(2^{2n+1}-1)}{2^{2n}} \zeta(2n+2).
$$
 (4)

In particular, we have

$$
r_1 = \gamma_1 + \tau_1 + \gamma^{(0)} - \zeta(2),
$$
  
\n
$$
r_2 = \frac{1}{2}\gamma_2 + \tau_2 + \gamma^{(1)} + \gamma\zeta(2),
$$
  
\n
$$
r_3 = \frac{1}{3}\gamma_3 + 2\tau_3 + \gamma^{(2)} + 2\gamma_1\zeta(2) - \frac{7}{2}\zeta(4),
$$
  
\n
$$
r_4 = \frac{1}{4}\gamma_4 + 6\tau_4 + \gamma^{(3)} + 3\gamma_2\zeta(2) + \frac{21}{2}\gamma\zeta(4),
$$
  
\n
$$
r_5 = \frac{1}{5}\gamma_5 + 24\tau_5 + \gamma^{(4)} + 4\gamma_3\zeta(2) + 42\gamma_1\zeta(4) - \frac{93}{2}\zeta(6).
$$

Numerical evaluations of the constants  $\tau_k$ ,  $r_k$ , and  $\gamma^{(k)}$  for small values of *k* are given below.

$$
\tau_1 = 1.257746...

*Proof of Proposition 1.* The key formula to derive the general relations (3) and (4) is the splitting of  $\sum$ R  $\overline{n\geqslant}1$ *H<sup>n</sup>*  $\frac{n^2n}{n^s}$  given by [6, Theorem 1] which is recalled below:

$$
\sum_{n\geqslant 1}^{\mathcal{R}} \frac{H_n}{n^s} = \frac{\pi}{\sin(\pi s)} \zeta(s) + \int_0^1 \frac{\psi(x+1) + \gamma}{x^s} dx + \zeta_H(s) \,,\tag{5}
$$

where  $\psi = \Gamma'/\Gamma$  is the digamma function. This formula applies to all complex numbers *s* such that  $\text{Re}(s) < 2$  and  $s \neq 1, 0$ , and  $1 - 2k$  for each positive integer *k*. Fortunately, the Laurent expansion of each component in (5) can be written explicitly.

a) The expansion of  $\frac{\pi}{\pi}$  $\sin(\pi s)$  $\zeta(s)$  at  $s = 1$  can be obtained as follows: first, we write the successive equations:

$$
\frac{-\pi}{\sin(\pi s)} = \frac{\pi}{\sin(\pi(s-1))} = \frac{\exp(i\pi(s-1))}{s-1} \frac{2i\pi(s-1)}{\exp(2i\pi(s-1))-1}
$$

$$
= \frac{1}{s-1} \left(\sum_{k\geq 0} i^k \pi^k \frac{1}{k!} (s-1)^k \right) \left(\sum_{k\geq 0} i^k (2\pi)^k \frac{B_k}{k!} (s-1)^k \right)
$$

$$
= \frac{1}{s-1} + \sum_{k\geq 1} (-1)^k \left(\sum_{j=0}^{2k} {2k \choose j} 2^j B_j \right) \frac{\pi^{2k}}{(2k)!} (s-1)^{2k-1},
$$

where the  $B_j$  are the Bernoulli numbers. Euler's identity:

$$
\zeta(2k) = (-1)^{k+1} 2^{2k-1} B_{2k} \frac{\pi^{2k}}{(2k)!} \qquad (k \ge 1),
$$

then allows us to rewrite this expansion as follows:

$$
\frac{-\pi}{\sin(\pi s)} = \frac{1}{s-1} - \sum_{k \ge 1} \frac{2^{1-2k}}{B_{2k}} \sum_{j=0}^{2k} {2k \choose j} 2^j B_j \zeta(2k) (s-1)^{2k-1}.
$$

Morover, the latter expression can be simplified thanks to the identity

$$
\sum_{j=0}^{k} {k \choose j} 2^{j} B_{j} = 2^{k} B_{k}(\frac{1}{2}) = 2(1 - 2^{k-1})B_{k} \qquad (k \ge 2).
$$

Hence, the expansion of  $\frac{\pi}{\sqrt{2}}$  $\sin(\pi s)$ at  $s = 1$  is given by

$$
\frac{\pi}{\sin(\pi s)} = -\frac{1}{s-1} - \sum_{k=1}^{\infty} \frac{2^{2k-1} - 1}{2^{2k-2}} \zeta(2k)(s-1)^{2k-1}.
$$

On the other hand, the expansion of  $\zeta(s)$  at  $s = 1$  is

$$
\zeta(s) = \frac{1}{s-1} + \gamma + \sum_{k=1}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^k}{k!} \gamma_k (s-1)^k,
$$

where  $\gamma_k$  are the Stieltjes constants. The expansion of  $\frac{\pi}{\sin(\pi s)}$ *ζ*(*s*) is then obtained by Cauchy product. We have

$$
\frac{\pi}{\sin(\pi s)}\zeta(s) = -\frac{1}{(s-1)^2} - \frac{\gamma}{(s-1)} + \gamma_1 - \zeta(2)
$$

$$
-\left(\frac{1}{2}\gamma_2 + \gamma\zeta(2)\right)(s-1) + \left(\frac{1}{6}\gamma_3 + \gamma_1\zeta(2) - \frac{7}{4}\zeta(4)\right)(s-1)^2
$$

$$
-\left(\frac{1}{24}\gamma_4 + \frac{1}{2}\gamma_2\zeta(2) + \frac{7}{4}\gamma\zeta(4)\right)(s-1)^3
$$

$$
+\left(\frac{1}{120}\gamma_5 + \frac{1}{6}\gamma_3\zeta(2) + \frac{7}{4}\gamma_1\zeta(4) - \frac{31}{16}\zeta(6)\right)(s-1)^4 - \cdots (6)
$$

In (6), the coefficient of  $(s-1)^{2k}$  and  $(s-1)^{2k-1}$  are respectively

$$
\frac{\gamma_{2k+1}}{(2k+1)!} + \sum_{j=1}^k \frac{\gamma_{2k-2j+1}}{(2k-2j+1)!} \times \frac{(2^{2j-1}-1)}{2^{2j-2}} \zeta(2j) - \frac{(2^{2k+1}-1)}{2^{2k}} \zeta(2k+2) ,
$$

and

$$
-\frac{\gamma_{2k}}{(2k)!}-\sum_{j=1}^k\frac{\gamma_{2k-2j}}{(2k-2j)!}\times\frac{(2^{2j-1}-1)}{2^{2j-2}}\,\zeta(2j)\,.
$$

b) The well-known Taylor series expansion of the digamma function:

$$
\psi(x+1) + \gamma = \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} (-1)^{n+1} \zeta(n+1) x^n \qquad (|x| < 1),
$$

allows us write

$$
\int_0^1 \frac{\psi(x+1) + \gamma}{x^s} dx = \sum_{n=1}^\infty (-1)^{n+1} \frac{\zeta(n+1)}{n - (s-1)}.
$$

This leads to the following expansion:

$$
\int_0^1 \frac{\psi(x+1) + \gamma}{x^s} dx = \sum_{k=0}^\infty \left( \sum_{n=1}^\infty (-1)^{n+1} \frac{\zeta(n+1)}{n^{k+1}} \right) (s-1)^k
$$

$$
= \sum_{k=0}^\infty \frac{(-1)^k}{k!} \times k! \tau_{k+1} (s-1)^k \qquad (|s-1| < 1). \tag{7}
$$

c) To obtain the expansion of  $\Sigma$ R  $n \geqslant 1$ *H<sup>n</sup>*  $\frac{n}{n^s}$  at  $s = 1$ , we proceed as follows: first we write the identities

$$
\frac{H_n}{n^s} = \frac{H_n}{n} e^{-(s-1)\ln n} = \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^k}{k!} \times \frac{H_n(\ln n)^k}{n} (s-1)^k,
$$

so that

$$
\sum_{n\geqslant 1}^{\mathcal{R}} \frac{H_n}{n^s} = \sum_{n\geq 1}^{\mathcal{R}} \left( \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^k}{k!} \times \frac{H_n(\ln n)^k}{n} (s-1)^k \right).
$$

Moreover, [4, Theorem 9] allows us interchange  $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty}$  and  $\sum_{k=0}^{\infty}$ . This leads to the expansion:

$$
\sum_{n\geqslant 1}^{\mathcal{R}} \frac{H_n}{n^s} = \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^k}{k!} \left( \sum_{n\geq 1}^{\mathcal{R}} \frac{H_n(\ln n)^k}{n} \right) (s-1)^k = \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} \frac{(-1)^k}{k!} r_{k+1} (s-1)^k. \tag{8}
$$

The desired formulas (3) and (4) are then easily derived by combining the previous expansions  $(6)$ ,  $(7)$ , and  $(8)$ .  $\Box$ 

### **3 Another expression of** *r<sup>k</sup>*

For arbitrary  $n$ , let  $b_n$  be the Bernoulli numbers of the second kind defined by means of their generating function

$$
\frac{x}{\ln(x+1)} = \sum_{n=0}^{\infty} b_n x^n = 1 + \frac{x}{2} - \frac{x^2}{12} + \frac{x^3}{24} - \frac{19x^4}{720} + \cdots \qquad (|x| < 1).
$$

The following formula is well-known [4, Equation 4.29]:

$$
r_1 = \sum_{n\geqslant 1}^{\mathcal{R}} \frac{H_n}{n} = \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{|b_n|}{n^2} = 0.529052\ldots
$$

More generally, for each natural number  $k$ , we deduce from [10, Equation (10)] the following identity:

$$
r_{k+1} = \sum_{n\geq 1}^{\mathcal{R}} \frac{H_n(\ln n)^k}{n} = \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{|b_n|}{n} \sum_{j=1}^n (-1)^{j-1} \binom{n}{j} H_j (\ln j)^k \qquad (k \geq 0). \tag{9}
$$

This expression should be compared with a similar formula for  $\gamma_k$  which is also quite well known [9]:

$$
\gamma_k = \sum_{n\geq 1}^{\mathcal{R}} \frac{(\ln n)^k}{n} = \sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \frac{|b_n|}{n} \sum_{j=1}^n (-1)^{j-1} \binom{n}{j} (\ln j)^k \qquad (k \geq 0).
$$

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
